

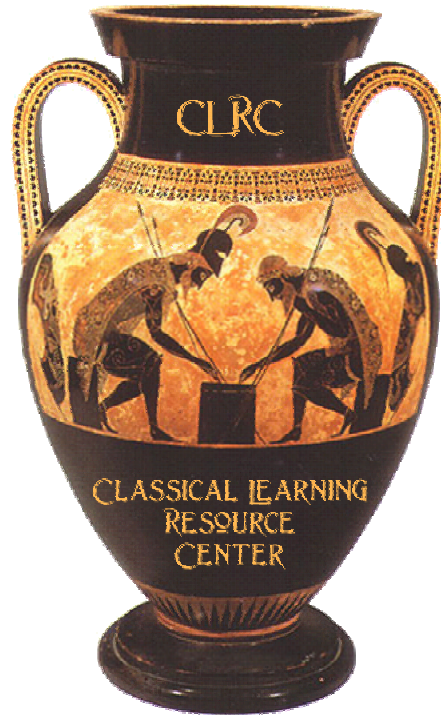
### *About the Instructors:*

- ◆ **Reader Matthew Gallatin** is a noted author (*Thirsting for God in a Land of Shallow Wells*), speaker, and podcaster (*Pilgrims from Paradise*). He received his M.A. in Philosophy from Gonzaga University, and taught philosophy at Gonzaga University and North Idaho College for 17 years.
- ◆ **Subdeacon John Van Fossen** was the founding headmaster of the Saint John of Damascus Academy in Santa Barbara, California where he taught history, mythology, and literature classes for 7 years. He received his M.A. in Classics from the University of California at Santa Barbara where he taught mythology for 5 years as a teaching assistant. He also spent 5 years substitute teaching in public junior high and high schools and assistant teaching in private pre-school, elementary, and junior high school classrooms.

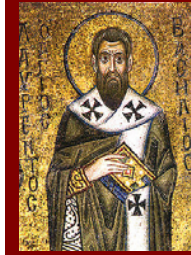
